### The privilege of ministry in Cambodia

The Revd Dr Howard Mellor writes about working in a country “where young girls are sold for the price of a pair of sandals”



**T**ucked away in the back streets of Phnom Penh is a jewel of a Bible School. It’s the Cambodian Methodist Bible School (CMBS), blessed with a committed staff and enthusiastic students.

It has been my privilege to help students engage with the Old Testament prophets in the setting of modern Cambodia. They have been reading Amos and his critique of political corruption, financial exploitation and his condemnation of the powerful who crush the poor and needy.

#### Abject poverty

His words have a real bite to them in Cambodia. This is a country where there is exceptional wealth for a few but abject poverty for most. It’s also a country where young girls are sold for the price of a pair of sandals.

My wife, Rosie, and I were invited there because of links spanning 20 years between the Hong Kong Methodist Church and the fledgling Cambodian Methodism. Rosie’s role is to support the teaching of written and spoken English, while mine is to assist in the biblical and theological teaching programme.

It’s an honour to work with the Academic Dean, the Revd Tiong Yeun, and Principal, the Revd Prak Vuthy, in delivering seminars and lectures for students.

Their students are devoted to their faith and studies. On weekdays they are up at 4.30am, attending prayers at 5.00am

for one hour. They wake me up with their enthusiastic singing.

Their day has a demanding schedule but they seem to approach it with joy.

## **An answer to prayer for the Bulgarian Methodist Church**

**Before Christmas the Revd Margarita Todorova wrote about the proposed new laws in Bulgaria. Here she updates us on a wonderful turn of events**

In mid-December Margarita wrote: Christmas is approaching and our hearts are burdened with worries. In May, four of the political parties introduced changes to the law on religion that aim to severely restrict all minority religious groups.

Such changes are in direct violation of the Bulgarian Constitution that guarantees separation between Church and State and religious freedom for all citizens. They threaten the existence of all minority groups.

### **Protest letters**

Despite protest letters from religious groups across the country, as well as from outside Bulgaria, Parliament passed all proposed changes. These included an increase in the minimum number of people required for registration from 300 to 3,000.

If accepted, this would threaten the registration of the majority of Protestant denominations, including the Methodist Church.

Politicians here want the law to be passed quickly and implemented immediately.

Despite street protests by Christians, one party leader declared openly that they would fight “with teeth and nails” for the articles to be passed exactly as proposed. Please continue to pray for us.

Then on 21 December Margarita sent us this update: Today, in its final working day for 2018, Parliament passed the new religious law in Bulgaria. We are happy to inform you that to our great relief 95% of the proposed restrictions were dropped.

### **Prayer marches**

It has taken a lot of work by many people to reach this outcome. This includes international pressure, as well as seven Sundays of official prayer marches and protests in Sofia and other cities.

It has also involved prayer and fasting, TV interviews, other



media activity and discussions with members of the Parliament's Commission on Religion and Human Rights.

We are grateful to God for all the support that we received. This has shown our politicians that, though we are a minority, we are part of a big worldwide family. We are a force to be reckoned with.

### **Tremendous support**

As a representative of the Bulgarian Methodist Church I would like to thank everyone who helped. I'm especially grateful to the World Methodist Council, the European Methodist Council and the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church women for their support.

We have one more reason to celebrate this Christmas. Our hearts will gladly sing praises to our Lord Jesus for his power and might, love and faithfulness.

# Tabita House, Bolivia

Sandra Goodwin from Methodist Women in Britain updates us on developments at Tabita House in Bolivia



Bolivian women

In 2017 Sandra visited Bolivia on behalf of Methodist Women in Britain. She was greatly moved by the hardships that Bolivian women face on a daily basis.

Eighteen years ago, FEFEME, the women’s organisation within the Evangelical Methodist Church in Bolivia (IEMB), had a vision for ‘Tabita House’.

With this project FEFEME, which is equivalent to Methodist Women in Britain, aims to create a centre with safe accommodation for vulnerable women. It will also provide training in useful skills

such as cooking, craftwork, reading and computer literacy, to enable women to find employment.

### Insufficient funding

Work began on the centre but with insufficient funding, the organisers were left with a half-constructed building without a roof. With an estimated cost to construct the roof of £11,780, there was very little prospect of moving forward.

On her return, Sandra encouraged women around the country to donate to help with the completion of the roof. This would ensure that the building could be used.

Over the past year around half of the amount needed has been raised. Last November the MWiB trustees, agreed to forward the full amount to Bolivia so that the work could be completed. Any further funds raised will recoup the deficit and any surplus sent will be used to equip the building.

# Cliff College honoured in Nigeria

Last November, with due ceremony and pageantry, the Revd Dr Richard Jackson, pioneer and coordinator of CCITC, was awarded an honorary Doctor of Ministry (D.Min).

This award was in recognition of the enormous contribution of the CCITC to evangelism and missions in many African countries. In particular, it recognises the work done by the CCITC in partnership with the Methodist Church in Nigeria, in their discipleship training.

Richard said that for him the most moving part of the ceremony was being embraced by the Prelate as one of their own. He said he felt enormously honoured to be acknowledged as the first Briton to have been recognised in this way.

## Settling in: volunteer mission in Argentina

Tiana Dinard-Samuel is an Encounter Worldwide volunteer placed in Argentina on behalf of the Methodist Church in Britain. Here she writes about her initial reflections on her placement

So, I finally made it! After nearly three months of visa complications delaying my departure, I arrived in Buenos Aires, a few weeks ago. I'm now looking forward to nine months of volunteering with CREAS, which stands for the Regional Ecumenical Centre for Advice and Services.

Currently, I am a student of Hispanic Studies and Film at London University. This trip is



not just an opportunity to learn about and work for God's Church in Argentina, but also a chance to improve my Spanish skills.

I'm finding that the language is slightly different to what I've learnt so far, but I'm sure I'll get there eventually. In the meantime, everyone has been so patient with me.

### Kind and welcoming

In fact, everyone I have met has been very kind and welcoming which helps as I adjust. I even got the chance to meet the Methodist Bishop of Argentina.

It does not yet feel like home, but the first time I visited the Methodist Church in Almagro, it did immediately feel familiar. As I walked into the foyer I just thought, "Ah, I know where I am". It was even better when I recognised the tune of one of the hymns and quietly sang the English words under my breath.

Then after 11 days of settling in and exploring the city, I started work with CREAS. It has various programmes.

### Promoting peace

The one I'm volunteering for is called Entrepreneurs of Peace. It provides training and support for young adults to undertake projects in their communities that are promoting peace, equity and sustainability.

My role here is to get to know some of the past and ongoing projects and write about these experiences. I'm also developing links with similar projects back in the UK particularly in our Methodist congregations, so we can share experiences, ideas and resources.

What CREAS does is really exciting and important so I am looking forward to being a part of it. I pray that I will do a good job and let God use me to do whatever he has planned.

## Return from Papua New Guinea

**W**ande Ebofin has recently returned to the UK after serving for six years with the United Church of Papua New Guinea. She thanks God for enabling her to serve in this way and for giving favour and security. Wande also appreciates all the support and prayer that she has received from friends, family and churches over the past few years.
