# Methodists nominated for Stephenson award

Our annual Stephenson Awards took place in London in February. Among the deserving nominees were Methodists Rosemary Hambly and David Stabler nominated for the Outstanding Supporter.

Winner, Rosemary (pictured), is a member of Callington Methodist Church, Cornwall, which raises more money than any other church in the county, thanks to her amazing commitment. She is a lifelong Action for Children supporter who has raised tens of thousands of pounds for us.



As well as raising money through his church in Newcastle, David runs the Great North Run every year. Since 2007 (as far back as our records go), he has raised more than £30,000 for us. But friends and colleagues say he's been taking part in the half marathon since the 1980s – and that his fundraising total is closer to £60,000.

The Stephenson Awards recognise outstanding staff, foster carers, volunteers and supporters as well as the young people who are part of this charity.

# New plaque for former NCH headquarters

A new plaque has been installed next to the 'Ajar' sculpture on the site of former National Children's Home (NCH) headquarters in Highbury Park, London.

The site was home to our headquarters from 1925 to



2010 before it moved to Watford. It has served several purposes including a hospital for NCH children and a family centre.

Young people from NCH homes who started full time employment often lodged at Highbury. For many, it was like staying with a

relative upon leaving home, and most valued the secure start in life that staff at Highbury gave them.

Due to the affection for the Highbury headquarters, Action for Children commissioned artist Gavin Tuck to design a sculpture to commemorate the significance of the site. 'Ajar' is a bronze sculpture of the first door to our first home at Church Street, which opened in 1869. The original door is in the reception area at our Great Queen Street office in London.

# Highlighting the impact of Domestic Abuse

Our Policy & Campaigns team continue to work hard to ensure the voices of children are heard, and to campaign for lasting improvements to their lives. In February, they held two drop-in events in Parliament, great opportunities to engage with both newly elected and returning MPs.

The first, just before Children's Mental Health Week (3<sup>rd</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> February), showcased the difference we can make through our mental health interventions. Over 50 MPs and Peers attended the event where they talked to three incredible young people who have taken part in our Blues Programme, funded by Royal Mail. They heard how the programme has improved their mental health. MPs then pledged to choose happy, healthy minds for all children and young people.

The second drop-in marked the launch of our 'Patchy, Piecemeal and Precarious' report which examines the support available to children affected by domestic abuse. Over 40 MPs and Peers attended the event, including a minister leading on the Domestic Abuse Bill that will shortly be reintroduced to Parliament. Two of our Children's Services Managers and our policy experts shared valuable insight into the experiences of families that have experienced domestic abuse. You can read the report on our website.
